

Arizona Revised Statutes

Chapter 15 - Nursing

- Creates the board of nursing which has the legal authority and responsibility to assure that all RNs, LPNs and CNAs are competent and qualified.



Board of Nursing

- Governor Appoints 11 Board Members
 - 5 RN, 1APRN, 2 LPN, 2 Public, 1 CNA
- Board hires Executive Director
 - Joey Ridenour RN, MS, FAAN
- Executive Director Hires Staff
 - Support
 - IT, Receptionists, Mail Room
 - Investigations
 - Hearings, Monitoring, CANDO, Triage
 - Education
 - RN, LPN, APRN, CNA, CMA
 - Licensing
 - RN, LPN, APRN, CNA, CMA



Application Elements

- Board Application
- Proof of graduation
- Fees
- Fingerprints
- Citizenship documents
- Application to test
 - NCLEX®



Application



- Download and complete application at www.azbn.gov
- Send proof of legal presence in the US
- Board will send fingerprint card with the deficiency notice
- Download NCLEX Candidate Bulletin at www.ncsbn.org
- Register for NCLEX on-line www.pearsonvue.com



Legal Presence

- U.S. and state laws require Board to verify legal presence in United States
- Most commonly
 - Passport—expired OK
 - U.S Birth Certificate + Government issued picture ID
 - AZ drivers license

Authorization to Test (ATT)




- Include your e-mail on your application to receive Authorization to Test earliest
- If only a home address; ATT will be mailed regular post.
- ATT is NOT sent by the Board; comes from PearsonVue.

What Happens to My RN/PN Application?

- Application is received by the Board
- Deficiency notice sent to applicant with fingerprint card—unless fingerprint card is included in the application
- Fingerprints sent to DPS/FBI
- Information received from program that applicant successfully completed/graduated—must hold degree/diploma/certificate
- Authorized to test by Board if you meet requirements
- Pearson/Vue issues authorization to test (ATT)
- Pass test; negative criminal background, proof of legal presence in U.S.= license

License Requirements

- Complete or graduate from an approved nursing program—hold a degree for RN
- Pass criminal history/fingerprint background check
- Legally present in U.S.
- Pass NCLEX


The Arizona State Board of Nursing's Online Verification system is a free service provided to licensees, employers and the public. Online verification should not be the sole source of verification and the original license, drivers license or social security card should be requested to determine validity. Do not accept a photo copy of the license as a reliable verification that the person is licensed.

Fingerprints

- Fingerprints required for new applications
- Fingerprints are valid for 2 years
- Results take an average of 14-21 days to receive
- Fingerprints not required for renewal



Timeframe Rules



- **30** days for administrative review
- **270** days to correct deficiencies--pass exam and fingerprints
- **120** days substantive review if negative criminal history
- **270** days substantive review if investigation required

When to Apply

- 1-2 months before graduation submit application to the Board
- Register for NCLEX
www.pearsonvue.com/nclex
- Apply only if you will actually graduate
 - Complete all grad requirements
 - Apply to graduate



Accommodation



Notify the Board 3-4 months before graduation ideally


- Qualify if:
 - Have a disability diagnosed by a qualified professional using recognized psychometric tests
 - Disability must limit one or more major life activities: eating, seeing, hearing, walking, learning etc.
 - NOTE: ESL and test anxiety are not ADA disabilities
 - Accommodation Policy available at www.azbn.gov under Resources/NCLEX

Current Fees--2012

- \$300 for 4 year license
- \$50 for fingerprint background check
- \$50 for temporary license—rarely needed
- \$200 to take NCLEX




Temporary LICENSE/CERTIFICATE



- Negative state criminal history
- Answer NO to four questions on background
- Pass the appropriate exam
- VALID FOR 6 MONTHS
- FEES NONREFUNDABLE
- **Current processing times make this unnecessary for most applicants**


The Application Questions



- THE QUESTIONS MUST BE ANSWERED YES OR NO!
- If Yes, all pertinent documents must be submitted with the application as well as a detailed explanation of what occurred.
- Investigation, if needed, before licensure

Question Number One

- Are you currently under investigation or is disciplinary action pending against your nursing license or CNA certificate in any state other than Arizona or territory of the USA?



Question Number Two

- Are you a participant in a state board/ designee monitoring program including but not limited to, alternative to discipline, diversion or peer assistance program?




Question Number Three

- Have you ever been terminated from an alternative to discipline, diversion, or a peer assistance program?




Question Number Four

- Have you ever been convicted, entered a plea of guilty, nolo contendere or no contest, or have you ever been sentenced, served time in jail or prison, or had probation or sentence deferred in any FELONY or undesignated offense?



Absolute Date of Discharge


- If yes to question number four an explanation must be provided that includes all information about sentencing including the date of **ABSOLUTE DISCHARGE** from the sentences for **ALL** felony convictions.



Felony Bar

ARS §32-1606 (B)(16)

- If less than THREE YEARS since absolute discharge, applicant is ineligible to apply for a certificate or license.



What About Misdemeanors?



- Discovered through fingerprints
- Viewed on a case-by-case basis
- May or may not initiate a formal investigation
- May result in denial or limited/ disciplined license

Juvenile Offenses

- Cannot use the conviction for discipline
- Can consider the conduct




ARS§ 32-1663 Section A

- The Board may DENY any license applied for under this chapter if the applicant commits an act of unprofessional conduct.



Unprofessional Conduct

- Any conduct or practice that is or might be harmful or dangerous to the health of a patient or the public.




Unprofessional Conduct

ARS § 32-1601(24)

- Committing fraud or deceit in obtaining, attempting to obtain or renewing a license or a certificate.
- Committing a felony, whether or not involving moral turpitude, or a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude.

Unprofessional Conduct

- Being mentally incompetent or physically unsafe to a degree that is or might be harmful or dangerous to the health of a patient or the public.



Unprofessional Conduct

- Committing an act that deceives, defrauds or harms the public.



Unprofessional Conduct

- Violating a rule that is adopted by the board pursuant to this chapter.



Failing to Report




- Incompetent practice
- Unprofessional conduct
- Mental/physical impairment and unsafe to practice
- **SELF REPORT**
 - Felony conviction, charge,
 - or misdemeanor charge involving moral turpitude
OR POTENTIAL HARM TO THE PUBLIC

Case # 1 Felony Conviction

- Ann entered a nursing program in September 2011.
- Ann was convicted of a felony drug offense in March 2012 received 3 years probation. She did not tell her program director.
- Ann applies for licensure in 2013
- Ann's application will be _____?

Case # 2 Alcohol

- Nancy has no felony convictions
- Undesignated offense DUI and assault
- High blood alcohol content
- Recent conviction




❖ BOARD OPTIONS:

- Evaluations, CANDO, Probation, deny licensure


Case # 3

- John misdemeanor DUI
 - Happened 25 years ago
 - Spotless record
 - Low level of blood alcohol
- ❖ BOARD OPTIONS:
- Case not opened or Dismiss



Common Violations of New Graduates

- Use of protected title, “graduate nurse”
- Administering medications or intravenous therapy without a license
- Deceit in job application



Common Violations of New Graduates

- Failure to assess/gather pertinent data
- Inappropriate delegation/supervision
- Exceeding scope—PN assessing; IV push drugs; working without RN/physician supervision; prescribing



- **STUDY DILIGENTLY THROUGHOUT YOUR PROGRAM**—don't just study for the next exam, study to learn how to give safe, competent care


